Currently, there are 11 enrolled in Kindergarten through 8th grade. The school enjoys an active and involved community and staff. Washington Schools vision is one in which the staff community, and students work together to encourage responsibility, integrity, and an enthusiasm for learning.

Washington School has two classrooms, a library, an administrative office, a kitchen and a multi-purpose room. There is a playground, a basketball court, and a small playing field. All classes are equipped with computers, printers, and Internet access.

Washington School is designated as a Title 1 school. The school is located in a geographically isolated, low income rural community.

## IX. Student Performance

The Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program consists of several key components, including:

- California Standards Tests (CSTs), which include English-language arts (ELA) and mathematics in grades two through eleven; science in grades five, eight, and nine through eleven; and history-social science in grades eight, and nine through eleven.
- California Modified Assessment (CMA), an alternate assessment that is based on modified achievement standards in ELA for grades three through eleven; mathematics for grades three through seven, Algebra I, and Geometry; and science in grades five and eight, and Life Science in grade ten. The CMA is designed to assess those students whose disabilities preclude them from achieving grade-level proficiency on an assessment of the California content standards with or without accommodations.
- California Alternate Performance Assessment (CAPA), includes ELA and mathematics in grades two through eleven, and science for grades five, eight, and ten. The CAPA is given to those students with significant cognitive disabilities whose disabilities prevent them from taking either the CSTs with accommodations or modifications or the CMA with accommodations.

The assessments under the STAR Program show how well students are doing in relation to the state content standards. On each of these assessments, student scores are reported as performance levels.
